TAB01: Introduction to Infant Mental Health, presented by Monica Oxford, Ph.D., University of Washington

Monica Oxford is a Research Professor in the Department of Family and Child Nursing and the Executive Director of NCAST Programs. Dr. Oxford's research focuses on early parenting and child developmental outcomes for vulnerable families living in challenging environments.

This workshop will provide an overview of toxic stress and its implications in infant mental health, attachment theory and parenting behaviors that support secure attachment, baby non-verbal cues, as well as review of resources and intervention programs. This workshop focuses on birth to three years of age.

TA03: Compassionate Classrooms: Creating Trauma-Informed Early Learning Environments

A child's brain develops more rapidly during the first three years than at any other point in the lifespan. As a result, the impact of traumatic experiences during this time has a direct and significant effect impact on the structure of the brain. This results in a decrease in a child's ability to regulate emotions, an increase in symptoms of anxiety, and other behaviors that can be disruptive in a classroom setting. In this session, you will learn how trauma impacts brain development and how to implement a compassionate, trauma informed approach in the classroom setting. Implementing a trauma informed approach is critical to ensuring that all children have a safe, nurturing environment in which to thrive.

About the presenter: Mary Allison has a master's degree in social work from the University of Washington. She is also a graduate of the infant mental health graduate level certificate program at the Barnard Center for Infant Mental Health and Development. Mary Allison is a licensed clinical social worker and certified clinical trauma professional. She works in private practice providing home-based infant mental health therapy as well as infant and early childhood mental health consultation to Early Head Start, Head Start, and ECEAP.

TA09: Play Attention: A Sensory Approach to Mindfulness in the Classroom, presented by Renee Metty, With Pause/The Cove School

Young children are already in the moment, so let's learn fun ways to integrate mindfulness in the classroom. As children get older a growing number of them lack self-regulation, impulse control, focus and concentration. By bringing awareness to their awareness at a young age we can strengthen this life skill that can be used throughout their lives. Let's prepare them to be learning ready and better able to handle their experiences with a greater ease. Combining the senses and basic practices, you will learn how mindfulness can be easily integrated into whatever you are already doing in your day. These practices for children will also help you reconnect your mind and body. Your role as a teacher is paramount in this process.

Walk away practical tools that you can use immediately with yourself and your children to manage stress and promote self-regulation, learning readiness and a positive classroom environment. These developmentally appropriate practices will provide a renewed sense of hope for both you and your students. Through this interactive and experiential workshop, we will use sharing, pairs, small groups, games, mindfulness practices, stories and humor along with some didactic teaching to help deepen your understanding of mindfulness and how it can be integrated into your classroom.

TB07: The Brain Architecture Game: Science of Early Childhood Development, presented by Allison Wilson, Eastern Washington University

Following an introduction to key concepts relating to risk and protective factors, participants will build their own brain using game materials, a roll of the die and life experience cards. The goal of the game is to build a brain that is tall, which represents functional brain ability, but is also as strong as possible so that it won’t collapse in later years under the burden of stress. Presenters will facilitate a post discussion on the critical period of brain development in the first 5 – 8 years of life, and our role as professionals to support young children, families, and our community. The workshop is appropriate for all professionals working across age ranges.

About the presenter: Allison is an Assistant Professor at Eastern Washington University. She received her PhD in Special Education and Early Intervention from the University of Oregon. For the last 13 years Dr. Wilson has worked as a Lead Classroom Teacher, Coach, Program Evaluator, Researcher, and Supervisor for programs serving young children and families considered at risk or identified with a disability or delay. This session will focus on the process of shaping behavior through the PTR-YC model focusing on reducing challenging behaviors and teaching new skills. Participants will learn about the model, how to apply it to their settings and gain tools that support fidelity at every step.

About the presenter: Kelly Jo Wilson currently works at the Colorado Department of Human Services, Office of Early Childhood. Prior to her work at OPSI, Anne served as a professor of mathematics at Arizona Western College and was the project director of a federal STEM grant to support increasing the number of STEM degrees earned by students. She developed a dual credit program for the regional high school STEAM programs. Anne began her teaching career in 1990 at Portland Public Schools and taught secondary mathematics for over 20 years. She also served as a program manager and instructional technology specialist for the K-12 science, technology, and arts magnet program and as an elementary math specialist. Anne supported teachers as an instructional leader for Systems Thinking in K-12 Education, designed curriculum and professional development in using dynamic modeling and systems thinking to support math and science instruction.

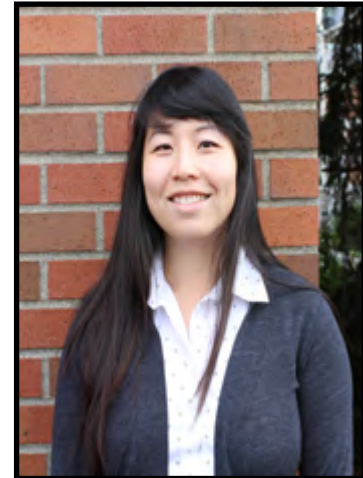
Plenary5: Learning in Relationships: Young Children's Early Social-Emotional Development, presented by Jane Hu, University of Washington

Endorsement applies to a multidisciplinary field including mental health therapists, social workers, caseworkers, early intervention specialists, early childhood professionals, home visitors, public health nurses, occupational and physical therapists, and others. This system organizes a set of standardized competencies that professionals must meet in order to become endorsed, ensuring that families receive high quality, specialized services and that providers are recognized for their advanced expertise.

About the presenter: Stacey Frymier, MA, LMHC, ATR, IMH-E®(IV) is an experienced clinician, consultant and trainer in the Infant and Early Childhood Mental Health (IECMH) field. SA07: Levels, Spaces and Holes: Transforming Your Sand and Water Table with Cheap and Easy-to-build Constructions, presented by Tom Bedard, St. Paul Public Schools

Children tell the story of discovery and joy at the sand and water table through photos and videos in a PowerPoint presentation that offers multiple examples of children exploring cheap and easy-to-build constructions in and around the sensory table. The constructions are made from common and inexpensive materials such as cardboard boxes and duct tape. Participants will be asked to reflect on their own attitude about play around the sensory table through a set of play axioms drawn from years of observing and documenting children's play at the sand and water table. Participants will be given a simple framework for building in and around the sensory table that includes seven straightforward elements and dimensions. The elements and dimensions are based on children's exploration and experimentation with the constructions. The framework is flexible, so can be used in any program. Participants will be inspired to see how easy and inexpensive it is to expand play around the sensory table with simple constructions.

About the presenter: Tom has a M.Ed., in Early Childhood Education from the University of Minnesota. Awards include: Minnesota Teacher of the Year finalist (2009); Kate Davidson Tanner Award from MnAEYC (2013). He has worked in the field for 38 years and taught thousands of children representing diverse backgrounds and abilities, in all age groups including infants. My particular interest in the field is the sensory table.
